



PROPOSED ITINERARY – GERMANY, SWITZERLAND AND ITALY

Friday, June 18, 2010

- Depart U.S. on overnight flight to Munich, Germany.

Saturday, June 19, 2010

- Transfer by deluxe coach to your 3* Munich area accommodations where you will be staying for the next three nights.
- Check into hotel and unpack.
- Welcome meeting and orientation.
- Free time to explore Munich. Visit the Statue of Bavaria, see the royal antique collection at Glyptothek, or the Schloss Nymphenburg Palace.
- Optional evening practice session.

Sunday, June 20, 2010

- Enjoy a 2-hour walking guided tour of Munich. See some important sights of the city centre including Königsplatz square, Lenbach House, Siegestor gate, Theatiner Church of St. Cajetan, Field Marshals's Hall, Royal Residence, Isartor gate, Viktualienmarkt fresh produce market, and Sendlingen Tor gate. Entrance fees to all sights to be paid apart.
- Participate in your first International friendly match this afternoon vs. German team.
- Evening Free for social activities.

Monday, June 21, 2010



- Morning practice session.
- This afternoon enjoy a guided tour of the Allianz Arena, which held the 2006 World Cup. It is the home stadium of "Bayern Munich".
- Play your second International friendly match this evening vs. German team.
- Evening free to enjoy your last night in Germany!

Tuesday, June 22, 2010

- Transfer by deluxe coach to Lucerne, Switzerland (approximately a 4 hour journey).
- Arrive in Luzern and check-into your 3* Lucerne area accommodations where you will be staying for the next two nights.
- Check into hotel and unpack. Free time in Luzern
- Evening practice session.



Wednesday, June 23, 2010

- Half day of sightseeing in Lucerne – Lucerne is a beautiful small city in the heartland of Switzerland, across the lake from Altdorf, where legend has it William Tell shot an apple off of his son's head. Visit the Chapel Bridge, the old city wall, the Lucerne Art Museum, or the Picasso Museum. Perhaps take a boat tour on Lake Lucerne.
- Play in your third International friendly match this evening vs. Swiss team.

Thursday, June 24, 2010

- Transfer by deluxe coach to Milan, Italy (approximately a three hour journey).
- Arrive in Milan and check-into your 3* Milan area accommodations where you will be staying for the next three nights.
- Check into hotel and unpack.
- Free time in Milan.

Friday, June 25, 2010

- Morning practice session.
- Transfer by Deluxe Coach to "San Siro" Stadium, home of Milan A.C. and Internazionale F.C. Take a tour of the Stadium then visit the museum where you can see tons of memorabilia including the shirts of players such as Maradona, Pelé, Zidane, and Crujiff and the Champion's League and UEFA Champion Cups.
- Play in your fourth International friendly match this evening vs. an Italian team.



Saturday, June 26, 2010

- Enjoy a day of sightseeing in Milan. Visit the Piazza del Duomo and the Milan Cathedral, Santa Maria delle Grazie (home of *The Last Supper*), La Scala Theatre, Galleria Vittorio Emanuele, Quadrilatero d'oro, Colonne di San Lorenzo.
- Afternoon free to relax at a café or do some last minute shopping.
- Evening free to enjoy your last night in Europe!

Sunday, June 27, 2010

- Depart Milan on return flight to U.S.

ABOUT GERMANY AND SWITZERLAND AND ITALY

Munich - Munich is the largest city in the south of Germany, about an hour and a half drive from the Alps and is close to Austria, Italy and Switzerland. Like many ancient cities, Munich started as a small town enclosed by a city wall, and over the years expanded out past the wall. The 'inner city' occupies this small area where many sites are close and easy to visit. You will get a sense of the ancient walls, the gates still remain. The city is a haven for all sorts of culture, with a staggering array of museums, a vibrant arts scene and the infamous revels of Oktoberfest.



Lucerne - An hour south of Basel and Zürich, and boasting invigorating mountain views, lake cruises and a picturesque old quarter, Lucerne has long been one of Europe's most heavily toured towns. When Queen Victoria came for a long holiday in August 1868, the town was already renowned, and a century of steady growth has resulted these days in five million admirers passing through each year. Tourism is the leading source of income, and yet the city has adeptly managed to retain all of its charm. The River Reuss splits the town, flowing rapidly out of the northwestern end of the lake. River banks on both sides are clustered with medieval squares, frescoed houses, ancient guildhalls, churches and chapels, and filled with a liveliness that belies the city's age. Aside from using Lucerne as a base from which to explore the region, it would be easy to spend at least a couple of days taking in some of its quality museums – a Picasso gallery, the impressive Transport Museum – in between walking on the medieval battlements, and exploring cobbled alleys and hidden garden courtyards.

Milan - If Rome represents the "old" Italy, Milan represents the "new" Italy. Milan is the most modern of all Italian cities, and it still keeps most of its past history intact. Milan remains the marketplace for Italian fashion – fashion aficionados, supermodels and international paparazzi descend upon the city twice a year for its spring and autumn fairs. Milan has an ancient city centre with high and interesting buildings and palazzos, that is why so many people from all over the world want to see the city of glamour.
